

YEAR BOOK COMMITTEE












INTERNATIONAL DAY

Teachers and students both had a fun and memorable time together on Teachers' Day . The teachers bonded more with the students through the activities.






9 Celebrations






ENTREPRENEURS DAY

MATHS By Shyuan Rhui Chang COMPETITIONS



MAA-AMC

For all the students who love, breath and live Math, the American Mathematics Competition, which is organised by the Mathematical Association of America, is one of the most anticipated competitions of the year. With a history of 66 years, this competition is notably one of the most prestigious of its kind.

On November 14th, our Year 7 and 8 students – 7 February 2018 for our Year 9 to 11 students – took part in this competition with enthusiasm, finding ingenious and efficient solutions. Our students worked under immense pressure knowing that every second that passed pulled them closer to the 40-minute time limit – while solving 25 highly challenging questions with accuracy. The relief that was almost tangible afterwards. Believe me, as a contestant, I can answer without any hesitation that the feeling of unease you get a few days later, when you question the correctness of your answers, was not pleasant at all.

But at the end of the day, the "AMC experience" paved another stone in our students' paths to be successful problem-solvers of this generation.

Kangaroo Math Competition

With a history dating back as long as the early 1980s, the Kangaroo Math Competition is an international competition with over 50 countries participating to form the Association Kangourou sans Frontieres (AKSF). On March 15th, several of our students took part in this prestigious Olympiad Mathematics competition after months of relentless preparation and hard work. On the day, students gathered in a classroom and spent 75 minutes answering 24 multiple choice questions, with a worth of 3, 4 or 5 points each.

During the competition, our students in the age categories of Cadet and Junior raced against time as each minute passed was a minute closer to the time limit. But once the competition was over and the answer booklets submitted, there was nothing but the tentative process of waiting for the results – 2 silver medals (top 1.3 to 3.3%) from Shyuan Rhui Chang (Cadet) and Samantha Tan Yi Ching (Cadet); 4 bronze medals (top 4.6 to 10%) from Jing Yi Chuah (Cadet), Dylan Khor (Junior), Tan Jun You (Junior) and Andrei Bayani (Junior); 11 honorable mentions (top 10% to 50%). Our students' diligence paid off and we couldn't be prouder of them!














PI DAY




Term 3 - Teddy Ville Museum












TRIP

YEAR 9 PENANG WAR MUSEUM TRIP

It is not your typical museum with glass displays and air conditioning: it actually is an open-air former British military fort built to protect shipping lanes in the Straits of Malacca. After falling into disuse for sixty years after the end of World War 2, it has been restored to tell the story of Penang's dark days under the Japanese Occupation from 1941-1945.


Following an experienced guide, we hiked through the museum, learning about what soldiers and prisoners-of-war went through during this traumatic period. Through the remnants of the fort, we were able to learn about the different ways in which the fort was adapted into a prisoner-of-war camp. The often chillingly ingenious and unimaginable ways in which the inmates were tortured and executed were explained as we weaved our way through the exhibitions. This allowed everyone to empathise with the experiences of those who lived through this terrible time and to gain a new appreciation for now living in a free and safe country.





One of the most thrilling parts of the trip included exploring underground bunkers as well as pitch-black claustrophobic secret passageways, which really allowed us to experience what it would have been like to hide underground during bombing raids. Furthermore, we "rose" to the challenge by crawling in a tunnel with lingering cobwebs and climbing up a nine metre ladder to exit the bunker in the museum! That was definitely an experience we will not forget!

Even with the fear of ghosts lurking in our collective psyche, the Penang War Museum was an exhilarating trip; it helped that our teachers made jokes to keep us on our toes. Thankfully, we all returned safely with Mr David, Mr Jeff and Ms Hui Yen.



BUSINESS BATIK TRIP

In February, Year 9 students went to Penang's Batik Factory in Teluk Bahang. Batik is a technique of wax-resistant dyes applied to cloth. It is either made by drawing dots and lines of the resist with a spouted tool called a canting or by printing the resist with a copper stamp called a cap. The purpose of the trip was to gain hands-on experience on how this technique worked.

At first, the students were given a tour around the showroom of the Batik Factory. There were many different Batik products on display including bags, clothing and scarves. The students also learned about how the artists make different batik designs using different methods.



After the tour, Year 9 students tried their hand at making batik. With drawn patterns done by the workers with wax, they chose their own colored dyes to create their own designs. The finished products were turned into beautiful tablecloths. Overall, it was a creative and rewarding experience where students were able to try out a traditional craft and learn new skills.



YEAR 9 GUA TEMPURUNG TRIP






Race 3 POWIIS -March
