

We come to the end of another school year. September will see some significant developments for the school, not least progress with our substantial IT upgrade which will be ongoing through Term 1. Immediately obvious will be out new IT Services Centre in the library. When Wi-Fi improvements were mentioned in assembly last week, there was spontaneous applause - which is worthy of more explanation! There have been areas in the school where the

coverage has been weaker, and where high internet traffic has slowed operation - but in general the difficulties we are addressing are where they impact on swift and efficient connection for staff as required for our teaching and learning. Recreational use of our system is a different matter.....

From the start of next term, on-line gaming will be blocked. This reflects concern that a significant minority of our younger students are preoccupied; we have also had questions raised by parents about how to limit game playing at home, including late at night which may impact on performance at school. Equally a concern, is the number of prospective entrants to the school who, when asked at interview how they spend their spare time, offer little other than 'playing games'. Physical inactivity with protracted digital entertainment is something we should be concerned about, as well as the psychological impact. The trend towards games including in-game purchasing of 'add-ons' and advantages, (such as in Fortnite), has been widely discussed in the media and is a market worth the equivalent

of an extraordinary MYR 10bn a year in 2017 in the UK alone. The global games market was estimated at \$139.4bn in 2018. It can't all be bad, surely?

Of course not, and indeed the industry is a viable and attractive career choice for the future. But POWIIS need not provide and finance a recreational activity through its infrastructure, which is primarily provided for teaching and learning. We see some students unable to see beyond digital engagement for their recreation.

We will also be introducing a 'phones out of sight' policy next term, in line with many other proactive schools around the world. We say forget the charger, and be in charge. Students will be told how this will work next term.

We finish the year looking forward to the biggest school roll in September to date, and of course are excited to see the opening of the Primary School. We celebrated a year of successes at Speech Day on Friday and congratulate once again (continued on pa2)

Year 9 Classical Greek Theatre

In this final term, the year 9 drama students have been introduced to classical Greek Theatre. Ancient Greek Theatre is the basis for most theatrical forms today. The students focused on Sophocles' famous play, Oedipus. This project has utilised a variety of skills and

has focused on building group team working skills, communication, and self-confidence. The Oedipus project has consisted of creating an improvisational task, devising and writing a group script, constructing a group research presentation based on elements from Ancient

Greek, as well as learning the basic elements of Ancient Greek Theatre History. To conclude the year, the students performed their own adaptation of the infamous play where they utilised masks, costume and choral work.
